

Survey of ST3 AiT Members: Snapshot into GP jobs and visa issues - Topline Tables

UK-wide Member survey from 25 July 2024 to 8 August 2024


Overview

- Pre-selected sample of 1381 Associates in Training at GPST3 level who had been recommended for CCT and had a training completion date between 25 July and 25 September 2024, across the UK.
- Online survey using Alchemer platform.
- 493 responses; 381 were complete and 112 were partial, giving a completion rate of 77.3% and a total response rate 27.6% of the 1381 invited to participate. Partial responses are included in our analysis.
- Relevant response rates and calculations for each result are set out. Some of the results displayed have a low response rate (>100) and should be treated with caution.
- For the purposes of this survey, questions relating to GP roles/work in the UK refers to working clinically as a GP within NHS general practice only.




Are you an international medical graduate (IMG)?









How easy or difficult was the process of securing a role as a GP in the UK? (n=196)



Is this role at a practice you worked for during your training? (n=196)



Why have you decided not to seek work as a GP in the UK? (tick all that apply)












RCGP Analysis of job seeking by ICS Region in England

In England, those recently recommended for CCT are seeking employment opportunities across multiple ICS regions (average of 2.7 per GPST3 respondent).



(Respondents could select multiple options, total = 447 selected by 168 individuals)

Health Equity Evidence Centre Analysis: Which ICBs have the highest concentration of GP surgeries in socio-economically disadvantaged areas? (2022)



The Health Equity Evidence Centre's 2022 analysis of ICB regions by highest concentration of GP surgeries in socio-economically disadvantaged areas, compared alongside RCGP analysis of GPST3 job seeking by ISC region shows an overlapping trend. The regions with a higher percentage of practices in areas of greater

deprivation are also likely to be areas of greater GPST3 job-seeking.

RCGP analysis of geographical distribution of our survey results is limited by the small sample size and no adjustment has been made for population size, but this may be useful to explore further as it may be indicative of fewer roles being available for GPs in areas of socioeconomic deprivation. Research from the Health Foundation in 2021 showed that after accounting for the increased workload associated with greater health needs in more deprived areas, GPs in deprived parts of England received 7% less funding per needadjusted patient than GPs in affluent areas.

A 2024 RCGP Report on Health Inequalities draws links between GP workforce, funding and patient outcomes, and calls for a review of core GP funding formulas, such as Carr-Hill in England and Wales, to better match resources with needs. The report highlights that deprived parts of the UK are significantly under-doctored, with practices in areas with the highest levels of income deprivation having on average 300 more patients per fully qualified GP than practices with the lowest levels of income deprivation.

Respondent's comments also highlight the impact of the GP employment pressures and wider issues on trainees' mental health and wellbeing:

- "I feel completely broken and demoralised after my GPST3... The crisis is very real."
- "Training as a GP is regrettable considering current circumstances of job market."
- "This is a real source of stress and anxiety and is pushing me to consider leaving GP in the UK altogether."
- "This period has been the worse experience of my life."
- "It has been an incredibly sad journey filled with tears."
