

Professor Stuart Murray

Stuart Murray qualified MB ChB from University of Glasgow in 1967. After working in Cardiology in Glasgow Royal Infirmary and as GP in the Vale of Leven, he returned to Glasgow University in 1975 as a Research Fellow. He became a Senior Lecturer in the Dept of General Practice in 1977 and Professor in 1992. From 1982 developed an interest in postgraduate education and appointed Regional Adviser in 1985.

Professionally he was concerned and motivated by the need to set high standards and deliver excellence. His overriding aim has been to raise through education and training, standards of patient care. This vision has been delivered by example and developing an excellent team who subscribed to this philosophy. The GP section in the West Deanery have a very good academic output particularly in settings standards, assessment, quality and scholarship. The output has influenced the discipline locally, nationally and internationally.

Research has underpinned his above philosophy and Stuart has 128 publications with 66 as first author. 59 of the publications have appeared in 4 journals - Lancet, BMJ, BJGP and Medical Education. This led to international links with North America, Australia, New Zealand, Singapore and the Middle East.

Joint Committee for Postgraduate Training in General Practice--member from 1985 and lead visitor from 1988.

The post of Regional Adviser become Director of Postgraduate Medical Education in 1996.

Retired on 30/9/11.

Now Emeritus Professor of General Practice at University of Glasgow.
